Mayor's Report

Welcome to returning council members Carol Gandee (Ward 1) and Malinda Miles (Ward 2). They were elected in May and will serve four-year terms.

In early May, M-NCPPC dedicated the Mount Rainier North Neighborhood Park to honor former Mayor Stanley Prusch and his late wife, Pauline. The Pruschs' civic activities included helping to establish the community pool, the nature center, and "pocket parks" in the area. The ceremony was well attended by friends, family, and dignitaries (including among others: M-NCPPC Chair Betty Hewlett, County Council Chair Peter Shapiro, former city council members (Joseph Bianchini and Otis Hayward), council member Malinda Miles, city manager Jeannelle Wallace, and myself. Last year, Paula (Prusch) Brown asked the City to pass a resolution requesting M-NCPPC to make the dedication and Council Chair Shapiro's office shepherded the project.

Congratulations to Pauline Carey who was a recipient of the The Washington Post Educational Foundation's Agnes Meyer Outstanding Teacher Award for her work at Mount Rainier Elementary School. And congratulations to Patricia Roy, another Mount Rainier E.S. teacher, who won the Christa McAuliffe Outstanding Teacher Award by Prince George's County Public Schools (the Christa McAuliffe Award is given annually to a teacher in honor of McAuliffe, a teacher in the county from 1971-78, and the first teacher in space; she died on the Challenger space shuttle flight in 1986).

Congratulations to Andrew Welter, 30th St., recipient of a Prince Georges County Municipal Association college scholarship. Andrew is planning to study mechanical engineering at the Univ. of Maryland.

The Washington Post reviewed "He Speaks for the Trees," based on the Dr.

Seuss story, The Lorax. The work was conceived and created by Patricia Krauss, choreographer, performer and Artistic Director of Seize the Day. Congressman Chris Van Hollen joined volunteers of the Help One Student to Succeed (HOSTS) program and read to Mount Rainier E.S. students. The program targets third-grade pupils who are not reading up to grade level. The lessons are structured toward the individual needs of each pupil, focusing on areas such as comprehension, language arts, phonics, writing skills and word families. FY 2004 Budget and Tax Rate

The vote on the FY 04 budget and tax rate will take place on June 17. The vote was delayed from the scheduled June 3 date in hopes the FY 2002 audit results will be available before the vote.

One major proposed change would be to our recycling program. The Council is proposing to have the County contractor take over the Friday pickups. The biggest difference to residents will be that mixed paper and cardboard would no longer be picked up. The county takes only newsprint and white paper. The proposal is attractive to the Council because we need to increase the time staff has available to do other projects like street maintenance and landscaping work. The elimination of the city-operated recycling program frees up the staff on Fridays for these projects.

Commercial trash fees would also be significantly increased under the current proposal. Businesses should contact City Hall or the Mount Rainier Business Association about the proposed rate increases.

Crime Drops in Mount Rainier—AGAIN!

Part I crime in the City reported to the Department decreased by thirty-five (35) percent during the first-quarter (January–March) of this year (2003). This most recent decrease follows a decrease in crime of five-percent experienced during the year 2002.

Crimes that experienced a decrease include: robbery (-18%), assault (-44%), larceny/theft (-16%) and auto theft (-60%). Several factors coming together simultaneously may have contributed to the decrease. We are optimistically cautious about the reduction noting that weather was certainly a factor for the decrease in crime as is our knock and talk efforts in the community and focusing our patrol activity to areas where crime is occurring as identified through our computer database. Our officers patrol efforts and their follow up on all activities are the significant keys to this success.

Officer Receives Training—Ready to Survey the Community

Officer Andre Williams recently completed a weeklong crime prevention and residential security course provided by the Maryland Crime Prevention Institute. Officer Williams was instructed on how to conduct surveys of residences so that he can advise the homeowner of the steps to take to reduce theft or burglary. Andre becomes the second officer trained in this philosophy. Anyone that desires to have a crime

And More Training

The Mid-Atlantic Regional Community Policing Institute (MARCPI) at Johns Hopkins University trained eight of our officers along with three from surrounding jurisdictions in Ethics and Policing. Suspect Arrested!

In March and April, three of our businesses in the 4000–4100 block of 34th Street were robbed within a two-week period. Although we normally turn over the investigation of this type of crime to the Prince George's County Police, our officers developed their own leads and suspects. While working with Hyattsville Police (who experienced similar robberies), we identified the suspect in DC and followed him into Mount Rainier. After a pursuit involving several jurisdictions, the suspect's vehicle was involved in an accident at the intersection of Eastern Avenue and Rhode Island Avenue where he was arrested by the U.S. Marshalls. He is charged with three robberies in

our City and several in Hyattsville. The suspect is awaiting extradition back to Maryland. Great work by CPL James Stoots.

Seat Belt Enforcement

As part of a nationwide effort to increase seatbelt use awareness during the months of April and May, officers' setup checkpoints at the intersections of City streets insuring drivers and passengers are buckled up with their seatbelt. Warning signs were posted that provided notice to drivers of the checkpoints. Drivers and passengers not wearing seatbelts received over 100 citations. Our checkpoints also looked for child safety seat belt use. Remember CLICK IT or TICKET; it is your choice!

How to Deal with the Mosquito Population

With summer here so is the all too familiar nuisance of mosquitos. Mosquitos can be transmitters of encephalitis, malaria, and yellow fever to humans, and heartworm to pets. Please clear your property of any potential breeding sites for mosquitoes. You can take steps to reduce this menace right at home, since many generations of mosquitoes can breed right in your own yard.

- Get rid of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles, or and water holding containers.
- Fill in or drain any low places (puddles, ruts) in yard
- Keep drains, ditches, and culverts clean of weeds and trash so water will drain properly
- Cover trash containers to keep out rain water
- Repair leaky pipes and outside faucets
- Empty plastic wading pool at least once a week and store it indoors when not in use
- Make sure your backyard pool is properly cared for while on vacation
- Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water with sand or concrete
- Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays at least once a week
- Keep grass cut short and shrubbery well trimmed around the house so adult mosquitoes will not hide there

Ward 2 Report

Thank you, the citizens of Ward 2 for your trust in me. I plan to represent you with integrity and dignity during my term in office. Here are some of the suggestions I have already received:

1. Do something about the flooding condition on Arundel Road

responsibility of taking and transcribing notes for City Council meetings and work sessions. This seriously takes away from the time needed to do other functions at City Hall. Is there a volunteer out there that would be interested in taking and transcribing minutes for the Mayor and Council meetings and work sessions? Let me hear from you. (*Note:* This has not gone before the Mayor and Council, but I want to know what you think, and if you are truly willing to help this City reduce its' overhead while becoming more efficient.) The second need I have discovered is the need to catch up on some much-needed filing. Many of our records are in boxes in no real order, and, therefore, are not very useful. If there are some real library types (or good clerical types), out there, who can donate a few hours a week to this task, we could really begin to develop historical files that document where we have been and point us in the direction we need to be going.

Since coming on the Council, the Police Department and Public Works have had to clean up many of our stop signs that were defaced by vandals. This mischievous act cost the City money, time, and served to show a real disrespect for City property. It is also a crime to vandalize public property.

We need to be vigil, and report such incidents immediately to the Police and Public Works.

These are small ways to get involved, but they are ways that will produce big rewards. I hope to see a large number of you on June 7.

Recycling Saves Money

Help keep City expenses down, and benefit the environment by recycling on Fridays. The City saves on the fee charged for dumping regular trash (charge per ton) when we divert items to the recycling bins. The fee for recycled materials is much less.

Use your yellow bins for mixed glass, plastic, and metals (no need to separate them). Bundle newspapers or put them in boxes or paper bags. Also recycle "junk" mail, cardboard, cereal boxes, magazines, and those heavy telephone books. If Friday is a holiday, save it for the next Friday.
